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## SUMMARY OF VESTRY MEETING HELD ON SEPTEMBER 19, 2018

The meeting was opened with a prayer.

The Vestry approved the meeting agenda and the minutes of the prior Vestry meeting held on August 8, 2018.

Treasurer's Report – The August 31, 2018 balance sheet and Statement of Revenues and Expenses for the eight months ended August 31, 2018 were reviewed. Following a discussion, the Vestry approved the Treasurer's report.

Rector Search Committee – Ed described his discussion with Rev. Canon Hallmark regarding our rector search efforts. The Vestry reviewed drafts of an advertisement for our rector position which will be distributed during the Diocesan Convention on November 2-3. Carol noted that The Living Church included a list of retirement announcements and suggested that we contact those individuals regarding

our rector position. Ed stated that he would follow up on this suggestion.

### Senior Warden Items-

Supply Priests – Marilyn noted that services for the remainder of September and October are covered by supply priests.

Sunday Bulletins – The Vestry discussed arrangements regarding the distribution of the weekly service order information and weekly readings.

Senior Warden Duties – As Co-Senior Warden, Carol will assume Marilyn's duties during her absence from September 30 through October 14.

Status of Licensing Agreement with St. Gertrude's - Marilyn stated that Father Leonard has the document on his desk and that he was awaiting a final review by the St. Gertrude's finance committee.

Payment to Canon Hallmark - Marilyn described her recent conversation with Canon Hallmark, who stated that she should not be compensated for providing supply priest services. Canon Hallmark also stated that she has not established a Special Needs Fund. She suggested that St. Christopher's make a contribution to the Bishop's Special Needs Fund which she could access by request. Ed moved that St. Christopher's contribute \$300 to the Bishop's Special Needs Fund in recognition of Rev. Canon Hallmark's services to St. Christopher's. The Motion carried.

Cost of Linens for Requiem Mass – Marilyn stated that the table linens for the reception which followed the recent Requiem Mass were rented because St. Christopher's table linens do not fit the new round tables in the Fellowship Hall. After a brief discussion, Ed moved that St. Christopher's pay the table linen rental cost currently estimated to be \$104. The Motion carried.

Organizing St. Christopher's Records - Marilyn discussed her recent work to review and organize church records and files and to discard old, unneeded files. Subsequent to the meeting, the Vestry reviewed the locations of various files and records.

Leelanau Enterprise Advertisement - Carol discussed the large weekly advertisement which has been running this summer in The Leelanau Enterprise and which is in addition to the weekly church directory listing. After a discussion, Ed moved that the large

advertisement be discontinued beginning in October. The Motion carried.

Stewardship for 2019 - Marilyn led a discussion of stewardship. The Vestry chose October 14 as Stewardship Sunday. The Vestry reviewed a draft of a stewardship letter and a draft of the 2019 pledge cards. November 11 was selected as the due/return date for the pledge cards.

#### **Committee Reports-**

Worship – Carol presented a letter which was received from the Episcopal church in Kentwood, Michigan. The letter stated that they, along with their Lutheran joint ministry partner, had prayed for St. Christopher's as part of the Diocesan prayer cycle. The letter was signed by numerous members of their congregation. The Vestry all agreed that this was a wonderful letter and that this type of letter should be considered by St. Christopher's in the future.

Building and Grounds – An ongoing problem with the PA system was discussed. The need for additional door stops was also discussed.

Ecumenical Relations and Service- The Vestry discussed the gifts sent to St. Christopher's in memory of Sylvia Linde-Guback. A list of the donors will be compiled and forwarded to Father Thomas Guback.

#### **Old Business-**

Personal Property Inventory - Marilyn and Carol discussed the planned inventory of St. Christopher's personal property. Ed offered to prepare an inventory list, organized by location, which will help facilitate the inventory.

Diocesan Convention - Marilyn stated that she will forward the "In Memorium" information when the submission period begins.

Bill Cook Vacation – The Vestry discussed arrangements to cover the organist position during Bill Cook's upcoming two-week vacation. Carol volunteered to fill in for Bill on September 23. Another substitute organist will fill in on September 30.

Labyrinth – Marilyn discussed the idea of constructing an ecumenical labyrinth within the Northport church community.

#### **New Business-**

Solo by Kate Mason on September 23- Marilyn noted that Kate Mason will perform a solo during the September 23 service.

Possible New Vestry Members- The Vestry discussed its current composition and the terms of current Vestry members. Possible candidates to full current and projected vacancies were discussed.

No other business came before the Vestry.

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### **SUMMARY OF VESTRY MEETING HELD ON OCTOBER 10, 2018**

The meeting was opened with a prayer.

The Vestry approved the meeting agenda and the minutes of the prior Vestry meeting held on September 19, 2018.

Treasurer's Report – The September 30, 2018 balance sheet and Statement of Revenues and Expenses for the nine months ended September 30, 2018 were reviewed and accepted. The Treasurer reported that \$3,145 has been donated in memory of Sylvia Linde-Guback as of September 30. The Vestry approved the Treasurer's report.

Rector Search – Ed reported that he followed up on Carol's suggestion to contact retirees noted in The Living Church to see if they would be interested in our open rector position. He noted that he has not received any response as of this meeting date. Ed also stated that he reminded the Bishop of our need for a rector during a recent pre-convention meeting in Traverse City. Ed also stated that the rector position ads are ready for distribution at the Diocesan Convention.

#### **Senior Warden Report –**

Supply Priests for the Remainder of the Summer – The Vestry discussed the availability of Rev. Guback during October and November. A supply priest will be required for services on November 4 and

November 11. Potential supply priests for these dates were discussed.

Sunday Bulletins – The Vestry discussed the need to notify the church secretary that she must prepare the service bulletins for the Sundays that Rev. Guback is not serving as a supply priest.

New Vestry Members – The Vestry discussed potential candidates for Vestry positions beginning in 2019.

Senior Warden Duties - The Vestry discussed covering the Senior Warden duties during the absence of Carol and Marilyn, particularly after Thanksgiving, when both Marilyn and Carol will be out of the area.

Compensation for Hosting Rev. Mary Frens and her Husband– The Vestry discussed compensating Janet and Chuck Dickerson for hosting Rev. Mary Frens and her husband on the weekend that she served as our supply priest. Chuck stated that they do not want direct compensation/reimbursement. He suggested that St. Christopher's make a donation to the Inland Seas Education Association. Due to the lack of a quorum, Ed noted that he will distribute a motion by email to all Vestry members proposing a \$200 donation to the David Dickerson Memorial at the Inland Seas Education Association. (Note: Via email, the Vestry approved a donation of \$200 to the David Dickerson Memorial at the Inland Seas Education Association.)

Diocesan Convention – Ed discussed the pre-convention meeting held at Grace in Traverse City. He distributed a copy of the Diocesan budget for 2019 and four resolutions that will be considered at the convention.

St. Christopher's Annual Meeting - Carol discussed potential dates for St. Christopher's annual meeting in January. Considering the availability of various Vestry members, the Vestry members agreed that January 19, 2019 is the most desirable date for the annual meeting.

#### **Committee Reports –**

Building and Grounds - Chuck discussed a problem with the newly-installed church building doors. He stated that he applied a lubricant in an effort to make the doors easier to open for parishioners.

#### **Old Business –**

Personal Property Inventory – Ed distributed an inventory list which was prepared from the prior physical inventory of personal property. The new list is organized by item location to facilitate the next physical inventory count and to make locating various items easier. Due to the busy schedules of Vestry members, it was concluded that the physical inventory of personal property may have to be deferred until next year.

#### **New Business-**

Gift for the Bishop's Administrative Assistant- Ed stated that the Bishop made a special request/appeal at the recent pre-convention meeting in Traverse City. The Bishop requested that parishes make a donation to fund a retirement gift for his administrative assistant. Due to the lack of a quorum, Ed noted that he will distribute a motion by email to all Vestry members to contribute \$100 in response to the Bishop's request. (Note: Via email, the Vestry approved a donation of \$100 in response to the Bishop's request.)

No other business came before the Vestry.

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#### **THE STORY BEHIND THE HYMN (#35)**

"Come, Thou Almighty King" (The Hymnal, 1982, page 365) has an anonymous author. At the time that it was written in England (approximately 1757, possibly by Charles Wesley), the British national anthem, "God Save Our Gracious King", had become very popular in England. However, the King, and this related national anthem, were not favored by the Methodists, who believed that the Eternal King was

greater than any earthly monarch. At one time in early America, British soldiers attending a Long Island church demanded that the choir sing "God Save Our Gracious King". The choir and the congregation sang, but used the words to "Come, Thou Almighty King" instead. This hymn is now sung to the melody of Moscow, instead of the British "God Save the Queen"; which is, of course, the same music used in "My Country 'tis of Thee". ### THE STORY BEHIND THE HYMN (#36)

"When Morning Guilds the Skies" (The Hymnal, 1982, page 427) was written by an anonymous German author, and originally was composed of fourteen stanzas, only six of which were originally translated into English in 1828. All of the stanzas recite instances in which, throughout our days, nights, and lives, God should be praised: such praise is not limited to church services. It is probable that the author was from the Franconia part of Germany, a beautiful land of castles, forests, and mountains. But no matter where we are, or whatever the nature of our surroundings, God deserves praise. [The Complete Book of Hymns, pg. 88-89; William J. Petersen & Ardyth Petersen, Tyndale House Publishers, Inc. 2006].

1. A new "floating" church, built on a barge and anchored in the river at London's East End, will be completed and ready for service by the summer of 2019. It is the second "floating" church in London. (The Living Church, 10/21/18, page 13).

2. An Iqaluit-based school, located in the Diocese of the Arctic, recently graduated its first class of ministers. The graduates are Inuit and bilingual (English and Inuktitut) and will serve the local Arctic communities. (The Living Church, 10/07/18, pages 12-13).

3. And now for a few words (culled from articles in Time (10/01/18) and The New York Times (10/14/18)...Do you have a stack of books you have not yet read? The Japanese word for such a stack is "tsundoku". Have you enjoyed a feeling of ecstasy while listening to music? The Arabic work for that is "tarab". How about getting together with others to appreciate flowers? In Japan, such a gathering is "ohanami". Ever experience "morgenfrisk", a Danish word for the satisfaction of a good night's sleep? word for the joy of being in control of your own time? So, here is a multilingual wish: After ohanami because you have otium, avoid the tsundoku, experience tarab, and thereafter may you have morgenfrisk.

Although the skies were all cloudy all day, the rain held off and the walkers stayed dry. It was a triple-header: good exercise; funds raised; and wonderful company.

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### **A THREE-CROW FIELD**

Have you ever observed a solitary crow remaining solitary for very long? Soon, at least one other cawing, yakking acquaintance will join it, then another, and another. Somehow, by mutual agreement reached via more jabbering, they all fly off to convene elsewhere. As other crows join in, the cacophony grows. Truly, these are social animals. An observer may momentarily spot just one crow in a field, but reinforcements are brought in immediately, and then you have, at a minimum, a three-crow field.

Crows are among the smartest and most gregarious birds, according to scientific studies. They just might have something to tell us about ourselves: Social? Check. Large, noisy, omnivorous, raucous? Four more checks. Crows walk rather than hop. They hunt in small groups. They have been seen using tools. They fly in long lines, to and from communal roosts, which can contain hundreds of birds. These eerie similarities, somehow, feel an eensy bit uncomfortable.

Recently spotting a convening crow committee meeting in a field, no doubt to discuss plans for the coming winter, their possible moves to new digs, and grumbling about the too-soon onset of snow flurries, we also know the inescapable: yes, there is something somber about November. Although we are fully aware of the waxing darkness and the waning daylight, there is nothing like the Official Confirmation that Daylight is Over, i.e. the end of Daylight Saving Time. Sure, for a few blissfully mindless days after November 4th, we enjoy more daylight in the morning... until the reality boom crashes down and it becomes dark at both ends of a day. Better get those "evening" walks in by 4:30 P.M., or carry a flashlight.

Yet there is always something quietly joyful about year end. Some of those joys are unique to this area: the tourists have gone home; no back-ups on M-22 when entering into downtown Traverse City; plenty of parking everywhere; best of all, hikes on sand dunes, forest trails, and beaches are all to yourself except for those solitary far-off people who enjoy the quiet hike just as much as you do. And when we are driven indoors to avoid snow, freezing rain, wind, grapple, ice, and sleet, we can then fully experience .....Cosy.

The holiday and blessings of Thanksgiving truly cap November, giving way to wondrous December. Despite the shopping-days-to-Christmas-countdown, there remain, always, those transcendent moments of pure peace, of certitude, and of boundless joy in the celebration of Christmas and all that it means, and all that it brings, to our lives and our world.

Treasure every moment of your own three-crow field.

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## ALL SAINTS' DAY

The Book of Common Prayer first included the Collect for All Saints' Day in 1549. Over the centuries, some of the language was altered in order to reflect changes in meaning of terms, yet this Collect still remains very similar to the original. All Saints' Day is one of the five great Baptismal Days, as well, signifying baptism as the "reception into the communion of saints". (Commentary on the American Prayer Book, Marion J. Hatchett, Harper Collins Publishers, 1995; pages 183, 268). This special connection of a day for baptism, to the day for remembrance of those departed this life, completes that marvelous circle.

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### COLLECT FOR ALL SAINTS' DAY

Almighty God, you have knit together your elect in one communion and fellowship in the mystical body of your Son Christ our Lord: Give us grace so to follow your blessed saints in all virtuous and godly living, that we may come to those ineffable joys that you have prepared for those who truly love you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen.
